


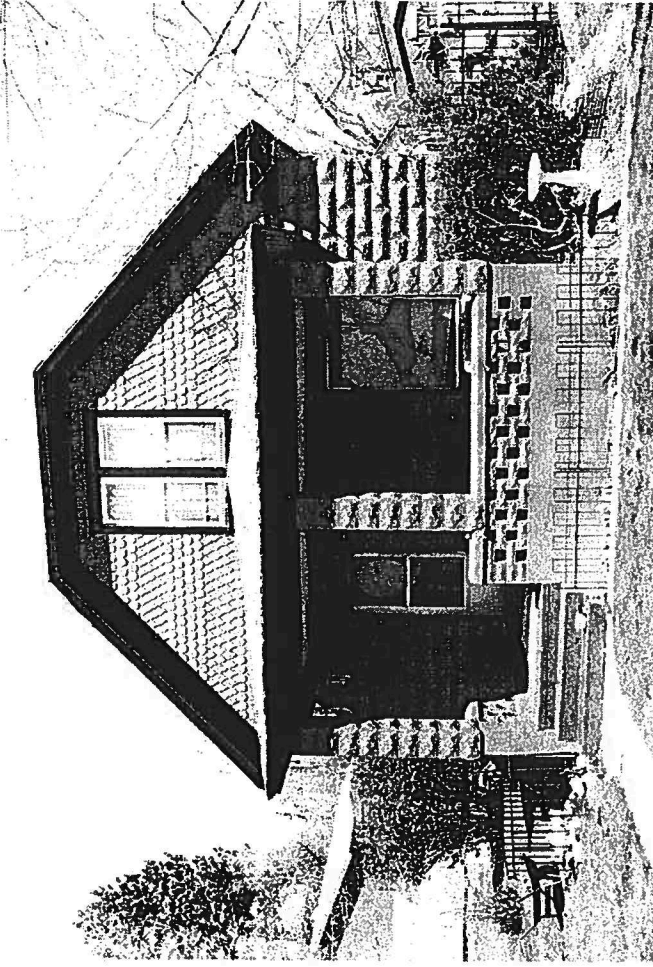

Walls composed of evenly coursed, rock-faced, concrete blocks. Raised concrete foundation. Gable face clad with variegated decorative wood shingles. Paired narrow double-hung sash windows with narrow transoms on gable face. Hipped roof projecting porch with slender concrete block supports atop basketweave concrete block balustrade. Painted concrete steps. Off-center entrance with door with oval light. Parlor window facing porch is plate glass. Chainlink fence encloses front yard. Gravel in parking strip. Large side yard. Garage has gable roof with overhanging eaves and composition roofing. Shed projection with entrance and grouped 6-light windows, and paneled and glazed hinged garage doors on south.			MOVED? HISTORICAL BACKGROUND: CONT.? No This house, previously addressed 176 N. Cedar Ave., was built in 1921 according to the Arapahoe County Assessor. The 1932 city directory indicates that this was the residence of Elmer A. Mumford, who worked as a plumber. Mr. Mumford and his wife appear in the 1920 U.S. Census. Mr. Mumford, 31 years old and born in Illinois, was employed as a truckdriver for a hardware company. Anna Mumford was born in Missouri and was 25. By 1953 this was the residence of Daniel and Ellen McKenna. The couple were retired. In 1961 H.J. and C. Virginia O'Brien lived here. Mr. O'Brien was a supervisor at the Martin Company. In 1962 this was the residence of Fern I. Walker.
