HISTORICAL BACKGROUND (DISCUSS IMPORTANT PERSONS AND EVENTS ASSOCIATED WITH THIS STRUCTURE): This house was addressed 265 N. Curtice Ave. prior to 1961. The house appears on the 1932 Sanborn map but is not on the 1921 map. The 1932 city directory indicates that this was the home of Frank and Grace Stumph. The Stumphs were married in Littleton in 1925. Mrs. Stumph had come to Littleton in 1922 to take care of her mother, Margaret Pickens, who lived next door at 5539 Curtice. Mrs. Stumph was born in Louisiana, Missouri, in 1900. The Stumphs had two daughters. Mr. Stumph was employed by O.C. Hoffman. In 1939, Grace Stumph married Taylor Stewart and they built a home on Windermere St. The Littleton Independent Anniversary Issue of 1938 indicates that Evelyn Apt lived here. She was born in 1917 at Anton, Colorado, and worked as a typist at Red Comet. In the 1939 city directory there is no information listed for this address. In 1953, this was the home of Ethel L. Coleman. She worked as a seamstress at Joslin's. Mrs. Coleman is listed here through at least 1965.
