


Walls clad with lap siding except for projecting front gable which has wide shingle siding. Paired, 6/1-light double-hung sash windows with shared wood surround on front gable. Door perpendicular to porch which has shed roof with post supports atop concrete deck and is on south side of house. HISTORICAL BACKGROUND (DISCUSS IMPORTANT PERSONS AND EVENTS ASSOCIATED WITH THIS STRUCTURE): The 1905 city directory lists Andy Finn, janitor at the Town Hall, as the resident of this house. Later, this was the long-time home of Nellie Scott, who was born in Iowa in 1882 and died in Littleton in 1985 at the age of 103. Mrs. Scott arrived in Pueblo by train in 1887. Her father, Jonathan Hunnell, a carpenter, drove the family by wagon to Rouse, near Walsenburg. Two years later, he moved the family to Aspen so he could work on the Jerome Hotel. Mrs. Scott married William Scott in Aspen in 1897. The Scotts lived in Cripple Creek, Victor, and Colorado Springs before moving to Littleton in 1918. Mr. Scott was a cement contractor who put in many sidewalks in Littleton. He died in 1939. The Scotts are listed in the 1920 U.S. Census on North Curtice St. with their five children (they had a total of eight children, two of whom died in infancy). Mrs. Scott was a homemaker, who never entered the hospital until her 70th year. She lived in this house until her age and health forced her to move in with Faith Stevenson, her daughter, a few doors south in about 1977.
