


ARCHITECTURAL DESCRIPTION: Two-story front gable roof frame dwelling with steeply pitched front gable roof with overhanging eaves with slight return; composition roofing; brick chimney on north roof slope. Louvered vent in upper gable face. Walls clad with lap siding; corner boards; concrete foundation. Off-center door is paneled and glazed with two arched lights. 2/2-light double-hung windows; single window in gable face. Full-width projecting porch with hipped roof has turned spindle supports, half-spindles, and stick frieze; concrete porch deck. Shed projection with entrance on north, also small projection on south. HISTORICAL BACKGROUND (DISCUSS IMPORTANT PERSONS AND EVENTS ASSOCIATED WITH THIS STRUCTURE): The 1905 Littleton City Directory indicates that this was the home of J.J. and Miss J. Stuart. The 1920 U.S. Census identifies this as the home of Elmer and Jessie Stuart Warfield and their children Winifred and John. Mr. Warfield worked as a mechanic. Mrs. Warfield, who was still listed here in 1938 along with son John, was born in New York in 1875 and came to Littleton in 1888. A Miss J.I. Stuart is listed on Curtice Street in the 1905 city directory, together with J.J. Stuart, a carpenter. Miss Stuart was affiliated with Fox and Stuart Dry Goods on Main Street in 1905. She married Elmer Warfield in Littleton in 1912. John Warfield was born in Littleton in 1914 and worked in the Piggly-Wiggly Safeway store in the 1930s. Jessie and John Warfield are listed at this address in the 1938 anniversary issue of the Independent and were still listed at this address in 1955. In 1961, James W. Morris, the current owner, is listed here.

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STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE: This house is associated with Jessie I. Stuart Warfield, who lived here for at least fifty years. Mrs. Warfield was affiliated with Fox and Stuart Dry Goods in 1905, making her one of the early businesswomen of Littleton. The house is a well preserved example of early Littleton housing with Queen Anne details, including the steeply pitched front gable roof, the 2/2-light double-hung sash windows, the door with two arched lights, and the porch with spindles and frieze.
