


ARCHITECTURAL DESCRIPTION: Two-story, front gable roofed frame dwelling with overhanging eaves; composition roofing. Walls clad with drop siding; corner boards; gable face has coursed shingles; concrete foundation. Projecting, hipped roof enclosed porch enclosed with multi-light windows and multi-light door; drop siding under windows. Center of gable face has Queen Anne style window with transom with multiple small lights. Paired double-hung sash windows with shared lintel above porch. Rear shed roof enclosed porch with divided light windows high in walls is faced with narrow beadboard siding. Paved driveway on south leading to two-car front gable garage with folding panel doors. HISTORICAL BACKGROUND (DISCUSS IMPORTANT PERSONS AND EVENTS ASSOCIATED WITH THIS STRUCTURE):

The County Assessor indicates a 1921 date of construction for this home, but it appears on the 1914 Sanborn Fire Insurance map and the 1912 Littleton water supply map. This appears to have been the home of Charles Kalinowski, an early Littleton baker. Mr. Kalinowski was born in Koenigsburg, Germany, in 1858, and came to America at the age of 16 with his family. Initially settling in Des Moines, Iowa, where he learned the bakery trade, he married Clara Bredull in 1879. The couple relocated to Denver in 1890 and Littleton in 1893. Kalinowski opened a bakery on Main Street that featured bread, cakes, pastries, and candies; the business also served lunch and carried groceries. The 1905 city directory lists Mr. Kalinowski at 134 N. Nevada and he died at his home on N. Nevada in 1916, having operated his bakery continuously until that time. [Records at the Littleton Historical Museum state that the Kalinowski house was at 5530 S. Nevada. An article in "Team Talk" in Feb. 1990 also gives the address as 5530 S. Nevada. That address is not found in any directories or on maps; this house is closest in number to that address.] Mrs. Clara Kalinowski died at the home of her daughter in Louviers in 1930. She was born in Brême, Germany, in 1857 and came to the United States at the age of 12 with an aunt and uncle, living in Iowa until her marriage in 1879. The Kalinowskis had five children. J.S. and Jessie Pierce lived here in the 1920-1939 period. Mr. Pierce was a salesman for Public Service Company. The 1920 U.S. Census indicates that the Pierces were both Pennsylvania natives; they lived in the house with five children.
