CONSTRUCTION HISTORY (DESCRIPTION, NAMES, DATES, ETC., RELATING TO MAJOR ALTERATIONS TO ORIGINAL STRUCTURE):
 Sanborn maps indicate that the building was originally rectangular, with the long sides of rectangular oriented north-south. Between 1914 and 1921, a porch was added to the building. Between 1921 and 1932, a wing oriented east-west was added to the house.

HISTORICAL BACKGROUND (DISCUSS IMPORTANT PERSONS AND EVENTS ASSOCIATED WITH THIS STRUCTURE):
 Prior to 1961, this house was addressed as 294 and 296 N. Prince St. The 1905 city directory indicates that this was the home of Benjamin E. Lilley (no occupation listed). The 1920 U.S. Census lists the Hazen H. Taylor family at this residence. Mr. Taylor was a 35-year-old native of Ohio who worked as a contractor. He lived here with his wife, Ethel May, and three sons. In 1932, this was the home of Mrs. Nellie Wright who worked at Couchman's Cafe. In 1939, Thomas and Lila Walter were listed at this residence with their children Dorothy and Billy. Mr. Walter was a street commissioner. In 1953-1961, this was the home of the Edward R. Harritt family.
