Audi Denver Littleton Twilight Criterium Celebrates 10th Year

The City of Littleton and Audi Denver announce the return of the Audi Denver Littleton Twilight Criterium Saturday, August 5 in Downtown Littleton. The event will be an exciting day for racers and spectators alike with a closed six-corner circuit where fields of up to 120 riders will average 28 mph with top speeds more than 40 mph.

"The Criterium will draw people from across the region for a race that has become the premier single-day cycling event in Colorado," said Littleton Mayor Kyle Schlachter. "We look forward to celebrating with the community the 10th anniversary of racing, live music, and family fun."

The start and finish line will be near Town Hall Arts Center at 2450 West Main Street. Racing will commence at 3 p.m. The family Cruiser Ride will start at 5:25 p.m., the kids' Strider Obstacle Course will be open from 4 to 8 p.m., and live music from *That 80s Band* on the main stage will go from 7 to 10 p.m. The highlight of the day will be the professional races, with women's races starting at 7:45 p.m. and the men at 9 p.m. where the nation's best will battle for \$15,000 in prize money.

"Criterium racing is the cycling equivalent of NASCAR," said Race Director Chip Brunk. "Racers are in large groups called a peloton and due to the closed downtown circuit, spectators are able to get in close and enjoy the excitement."

The Audi Denver Littleton Twilight Criterium is sanctioned by USA Cycling and part of the American Criterium Cup, a 10-race series that elevates the stature of criterium racing in the United States.

All cars will need to be off the streets on the race course beginning at 10 a.m. August 5. Residents and visitors can park at the Littleton Center, 2255 West Berry Avenue, or at Arapahoe Community College. Traffic will be significantly impacted by the detours.

Three City Council Seats Up for Election in November

Three of Littleton's seven seats on city council will be up for election this November – in District II, the city's northeast quadrant; in District IV, the city's southwest quadrant; and one At-Large, covering the entire city.

Residents interested in running must be a citizen of the United States, at least 21 years old, and a registered voter in the city for at least 12 consecutive months prior to the election. Council members may not hold other elected public office or be a paid employee of the city or another municipality.

Nomination petitions to become a city council candidate will be available at the city clerk's office at the Littleton Center beginning at 8 a.m. Tuesday, August 8. Nominations must be signed by a minimum of 50 qualified registered voters, and petitions are due no later than Monday, August 28.

Littleton's mayor is paid \$1,350 per month, the mayor pro tem is paid \$1,225, and city council members are paid \$1,100 per month. Council meets on the first and third Tuesday of the month at 6:30 p.m., and study sessions are held on second and fourth Tuesdays as needed.

Emerald Ash Borer Arrives in Littleton

Arapahoe County's first case of emerald ash borer (EAB) has been identified in northeast Littleton. The infestations of the invasive wood-boring insect are fatal to ash trees, which make up roughly 15% of Littleton's tree canopy. EAB was first discovered on Colorado's Front Range in 2013.

The larval stage of EAB feeds under the bark of trees, cutting off the flow of water and nutrients. Infested trees become structurally unsound and gradually die within a few years.

Determining the presence of EAB is often difficult. Symptoms include sparse leaves or branches in the upper canopy, vertical splits in bark with S-shaped galleries beneath, smaller leaves at branch tips, D-shaped exit holes on branches, and shoots growing from the main trunk or near the center of the tree. It is important to note that there are a variety of boring insects that produce exit holes in ash trees. These other pests (lilac ash borer, long horned beetle, etc.) leave a circular exit hole and are overall less detrimental.

Residents can take steps to protect healthy ash trees, but certain options such as insecticide treatments depend on the size and health of each tree. While residents can apply their own insecticides, those available to licensed arborists are far more effective.

Because emerald ash borer kills trees over a period of several years, trees that are not candidates for insecticide treatments will eventually need to be removed. Residents should follow guidelines for properly disposing of any infested wood.

Dennis Quinn Begins as New Bemis Public Library Director

Following a nationwide search, Littleton City Manager Jim Becklenberg selected Dennis Quinn to become the new director of the Bemis Public Library. Most recently, Quinn served as the Director of Library Services for the City of Coppell, Texas, where he managed a team of 25 employees with a \$2 million annual budget. In his 10 years of public library leadership, Quinn led his team in raising the bar for library operations and performance by developing high-quality programming and services, including award-winning programs such as "Meet Your Neighbor," a panel discussion series aimed at bridging gaps of understanding in the community.



"Dennis experience in strategic planning, policy development, budget administration, facility planning, project management, and developing high-functioning teams make him the ideal person to lead one of Littleton's most valued institutions," Becklenberg said. "I also look forward to him being a valued contributor to our Leadership Team."

Quinn earned a master's degree in Library and Information Science, and a bachelor's degree in Music History and Literature from the University of North Texas. "The work of libraries is ultimately about connecting people to ideas, experiences, resources, and each other," Quinn said. "Now more than ever, this work is vital to building strong, vibrant, and inclusive communities. The talented and creative staff at the Bemis Library have demonstrated this by creating welcoming spaces for people of all walks of life to explore and learn together, and by bridging gaps of accessibility for our most vulnerable community members. I look forward to working with the library team and our many partners throughout the community as we write the next chapter of the library's history together and help make the Littleton of tomorrow even brighter than it is today."

Online Self-Service Available for Omnibus

Riders will soon be able to use an online scheduling service for Littleton's Omnibus, which provides transportation to seniors and people with disabilities. The service has been operated by Via Colorado since 2021.

The appointment-based ride service is available to Littleton residents Monday through Friday from 8 a.m. to 2 p.m. Riders can arrange for transportation anywhere within the City of Littleton, as well as nearby locations outside the city limits including Kaiser Permanente in Centennial or the Arapahoe County Public Health Department in Englewood. The Omnibus can also pick up and deliver pre-paid grocery orders within the city limits.



The new self-service portal will allow scheduling up to seven days in advance and will provide real-time updates, reducing the potential for scheduling errors. Scheduling by phone will remain available.

projects – ranging from street repaving and sealing to major water and sewer line replacements. Here is a look at some of the recent progress.

The first of three raised pedestrian crossings in downtown opens to the public



Pedestrian safety is a high priority for the city, which is why it is undertaking improvements at three high-use crossing locations downtown and constructing three raised pedestrian crossings.

"These raised pedestrian crossings will enhance safety by slowing down traffic and improving pedestrian visibility for drivers," said Aaron Heumann, Littleton's transportation engineering manager. "The crossings will also include flashing beacons to make them more visible to drivers."

The first raised crosswalk on Main Street, north of Bega Park, is now complete. The project was finished two times faster than initially anticipated thanks to the full closure of Main Street – and the city is grateful to residents and visitors for their patience during this time.

From now through October, raised pedestrian crossings will be built on Alamo Avenue at Bega Park and Prince Street at Little's Creek Trail (right next to the RTD Littleton/Downtown Station).

Twenty-five miles of roads getting replaced, repaved, and/or protected



The city will work on 25 lane-miles of concrete replacement this summer and fall, including patching roadways and applying slurry seal. Slurry seal is a technique that protects roads from invasive moisture, mitigates UV damage, breaks down oils in the asphalt, and adds traction to the surface.

"The best part of using slurry seal is that it is a cost-effective method to extend the life of the pavement and reduces the frequency of expensive overlays or reconstruction," said Matthew Matuszewski, Littleton's capital improvement program manager.

This project is anticipated to be completed by early fall, and will mainly impact residential streets. Residents affected by this project will be notified ahead of time and will receive information about street closures, parking, and more.

Road improvements and maintenance in Aberdeen Village

A lot is happening in the Aberdeen Village neighborhood, with road improvements and maintenance in full swing by late summer.

The city will start by removing old asphalt from the roads and patching severely deteriorated areas. Next, a fresh two-inch layer of asphalt will be applied.

"These improvements will result in better safety, drainage, and preventative maintenance to avoid costly full reconstruction down the road," said City Engineer Kyle Morris.

While road work is underway, intermittent and temporary lane closures will be in effect for roughly three months. Residents impacted by this project will receive advance notice and important details about street closures and parking.

Making Reynolds Landing Park an Immersive Experience



Reynolds Landing Park is on its way to becoming a more nature-focused enclave in the heart of Littleton. Updates will include restoring the South Platte River, making the park ADA accessible, and creating a tubing area for families. Initial construction will also include improvements to the Mary Carter Greenway Trail. The project is working through final design, permitting, and funding, and construction is expected to start this winter.

"The focus of this project is remaking the park to be a true nature getaway," said Kelsey Stansfield, Littleton's manager of grounds, open space, and natural resources. "People can enter and in just a few steps feel like they have completely left the city environment and are totally immersed in nature."

Access to portions of the river and areas of the park will close off and on during construction.

These projects are possible thanks to Littleton voters approving ballot question 3A in 2021 and with the support of Arapahoe County Open Spaces, the Mile High Flood District, South Suburban Parks and Recreation, the Colorado Water Conservation Board, and Great Outdoors Colorado.

Littleton Police Department Completes ABLE Training

All of the Littleton Police Department's (LPD) sworn officers have now completed Active Bystandership for Law Enforcement (ABLE) training. ABLE training prepares officers to intervene and accept interventions to prevent misconduct, avoid mistakes, and promote officer health and wellness. Developed by the Center for Innovation in Community Safety, ABLE training helps reduce harm to civilians and officers, and improves police/community relations and officer job satisfaction. The LPD joins more than 300 departments nationwide to participate in the training.

"Our department prides itself in utilizing all resources available to law enforcement to better ourselves and our commitment to serve our community," said Littleton Police Chief Doug Stephens. "I take pride in our officers and their commitment to consistently and humbly better themselves through all available means."

Voters Could Decide on Marijuana Tax Increase

Littleton voters could decide this November whether to increase taxes on retail marijuana to support community mental health and public safety programs.

Retail marijuana in Littleton is currently subject to a 3.75% general sales tax and a 3% special retail marijuana sales tax, for a total of 6.75%, putting it among the lower tier of retail marijuana tax rates on the Front Range.

City council is weighing a proposal to ask voters to increase the special retail marijuana sales tax rate by an additional 3% or 4%, which projections estimate could raise upwards of \$360,000 or \$480,000 respectively, per year, earmarked for public safety or mental health programs. If council decides to place the question on the ballot and voters approve, additional mental health co-responders and a case manager could be funded to assist people in crisis. The Littleton Police Department could also expand proactive police programs such as the Special Enforcement Team to provide more foot and bike patrols downtown and in parks and trails.

City council is scheduled to hold a study session August 8, first reading August 15, with a public hearing scheduled for August 22. Election Day is Tuesday, November 7.

City Council Districts Undergo Minor Realignments

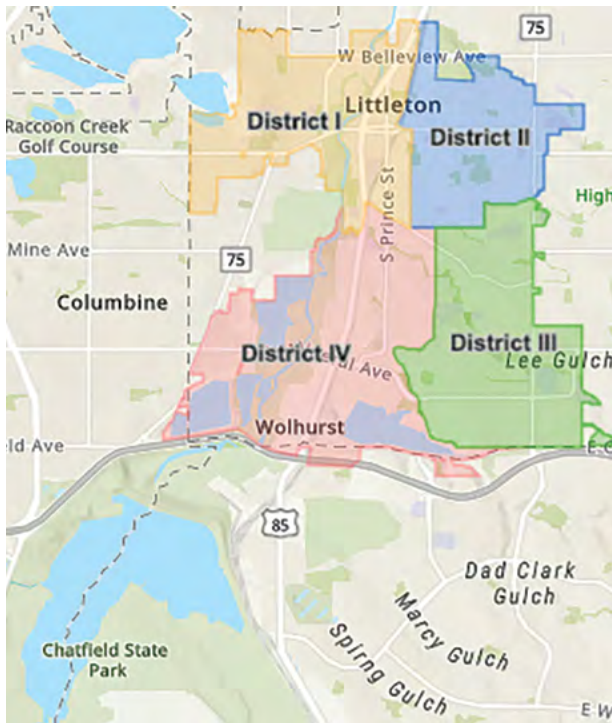
The borders of Littleton's four city council districts underwent minor realignments in 2023 as part of a legally-required redistricting effort following the 2020 United States Census.

Littleton's charter requires the city's four council districts to be, "contiguous, compact, as nearly rectangular as practicable and have approximately the same population," and requires reevaluation following the federal census every 10 years.








The city's election commission met with Littleton's geographic information system specialists to develop three options to ensure all council districts meet the charter requirements, then presented the options for public comment over a month-long community engagement period.

Option B, which was the strongest preference from community outreach sessions, was formally adopted by city council in June. Notices were sent by mail to all 877 households subject to a district change.

Seats in council Districts II and IV, respectively the city's northeast and southwest quadrants, will be on the November election ballot in 2023. Tri-Cities Homelessness Initiative Making Headway

The Tri-Cities Homelessness Initiative is a collaborative effort to address homelessness in Littleton, Englewood, and Sheridan. Consisting of city and county agencies and local nonprofits, Tri-Cities is guided by an Action Plan to increase services and develop pathways out of homelessness.

Tri-Cities continues to make strides toward reducing homelessness in the region. The group is poised to award a contract for a Navigation Center that will serve as a lead service provider, and working to secure funding from the State of Colorado.

The group is also working with Arapahoe County to strengthen outreach to landlords with capacity to provide affordable housing, both to offer placements for those climbing out of homelessness, and to ensure vulnerable people stay housed to avoid becoming homeless in the first place.

In May, the group launched TriCitiesHomeless.com, a one-stop website providing access to resources for those experiencing homelessness, opportunities for neighbors to volunteer with local outreach organizations, and downloadable monthly reports tracking progress and impact.

The website also features *In Their Words*, a series of profiles of people climbing out of homelessness with help from Tri-Cities partner agencies.



President Biden Awards Littleton Police Officer with Medal of Valor

President Joe Biden awarded Littleton Police Corporal Jeff Farmer with the Public Safety Officer Medal of Valor May 17. This medal is the highest national award for valor by a public safety officer and Corporal Jeff Farmer is the first Colorado officer to receive this honor. Corporal Farmer received this medal for his extraordinary bravery, selflessness, and quick thinking on the evening of September 20, 2021, when he rescued Officer David Snook after he was shot multiple times by a fleeing suspect. Farmer, who was also injured, returned fire at the suspect and pulled Snook to safety. Farmer then transported Snook to the hospital,



saving his life. "I am extremely proud of the daily dedication and commitment of our officers, who continue to go above and beyond," said Police Chief Doug Stephens. "To stand in the White House as the President of the United States recognized one of Littleton's own was a humbling honor. It is a testament to the commitment, self-sacrifice, and bravery made by each of our officers daily. This great work by the Littleton Police Department is made possible by the continued support of the Littleton community."

Downtown Development Authority Lays Out Future Plans

The Littleton Downtown Development Authority (LDDA) outlined its first Plan of Development this spring, with big plans to help downtown thrive into the future.

Voters approved the formation of the LDDA in 2022, creating an entity providing financing and leadership for improving the downtown business district.

The plan, developed after input from hundreds of downtown stakeholders and residents, focuses on five main goals: creating a downtown that is well-connected, welcoming and beautiful, clean and safe, business-friendly and vibrant, and with an improved parking experience.

The plan includes a variety of project ideas, including proposals to help fill vacant storefronts, enhance alleys with murals and better lighting, add flower planters, and improve pedestrian safety.

The LDDA will work in collaboration with the City of Littleton's Downtown Mobility and Streetscape Improvement Plan, an effort to enhance downtown as a premier destination for shopping, dining, and socializing.

Summer Storms Cause Culvert Failure

On June 12, 2023, following record-breaking rainfalls, the stormwater culvert carrying Jackass Gulch across Jackass Hill Road, just north of Mineral Avenue, collapsed. The two existing 48-inch diameter corrugated steel pipes were installed in 1985 and this material is now known to be prone to corrosion and failure. Crews are replacing the metal pipes with two 66-inch diameter reinforced concrete pipes, which are far more durable. The increased size will also help handle much greater flows going forward.

On average, Littleton receives 14 inches of rain a year, but the city received more than that by the start of July. Rainfall in June alone was four times the average. This has left the ground saturated and caused further debris collapse into the damaged area, though crews have been working quickly to overcome it.

Crews hope to complete the project and reopen the road by mid-August. Thankfully, contractors were able to quickly obtain the larger concrete pipe – normally pipes of this size require months to fabricate, which would have pushed the reopening into the fall.

Replacement of these culverts and the need for a larger size was being studied as part of an update to the Jackass Gulch Master Plan, and designed as part of the Mineral Mobility Improvements Project, planned for 2024. Design was far enough along to replace the culverts now, rather than undertake a temporary solution only to dig up the area again in a year. This accelerated the design of the emergency project by many weeks.

Littleton to Welcome Australian Sister City Delegates

Littleton will welcome a delegation from its sister city of Bega, Australia just in time for Western Welcome Week in August, continuing a tradition of international friendship dating back more than 60 years.

Representatives from the Land Down Under will be welcomed with a reception at Bega Park Thursday, August 10, at 12:30 p.m. including the exchange of gifts, and performances of the *Star Spangled Banner* and *Advance Australia Fair*, the Australian national anthem.

The Littleton-Bega relationship dates back to the 1950s, when *Bega District News* editor Curly Annabel saw *Small Town Editor*, a short film about Houstoun Waring, then the editor and publisher of the *Littleton Independent*. Seeing similarities between the can-do spirit and civic pride of Bega and Littleton, the two editors initiated the cultural exchange that endures today.



Though Bega remains a small farm town, much like Littleton was in the mid-20th century, the two towns retain a strong sense of camaraderie. Delegates visit each other every other year, often bearing unique gifts from each respective homeland.

Bega's delegates will enjoy a fun-filled week with host families in Littleton and will march in the Western Welcome Week Grand Parade Saturday, August 19.

Littleton residents are invited to help give Bega's delegates a warm welcome at the opening reception, at Bega Park, at the east end of Main Street in Downtown Littleton.

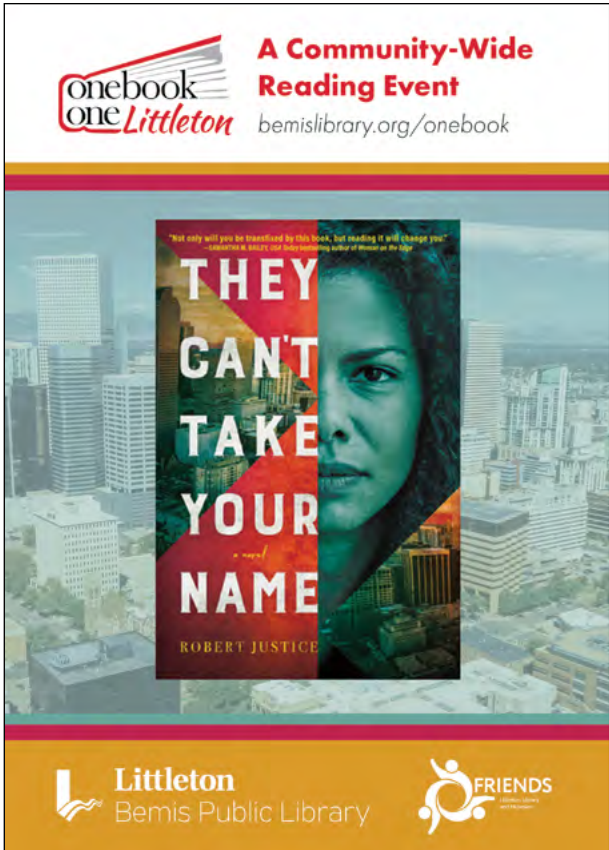

Apply Now for Local Partnership Grants and Stadium District Grants

Each year the Littleton City Council considers requests for discretionary grants, historically from nonprofit organizations that serve Littleton residents, and awards the grants to the organizations during the budget process. For the 2024 award cycle, in addition to Local Partnership Funding grants, the city is including distribution of Stadium District Funds as part of the same application process. Stadium District Funds are a one-time payment to the city related to the purchase of the Denver Broncos Football Club to be spent specifically on youth events and activities. To qualify for these funds, applicants must demonstrate how their use of the funds will promote and engage youth in the community. The applications opened July 21, and will close at 5 p.m. August 21, 2023. Applicants will be notified of funding decisions upon city council's review scheduled for October 2023.
