

HISTORICAL BACKGROUND (DISCUSS IMPORTANT PERSONS AND EVENTS ASSOCIATED WITH THIS STRUCTURE):

Prior to 1961, this house was addressed 275 N. Curtice Ave. The house does not appear on the 1921 Sanborn map, but is on the 1932 map. In 1932, Mrs. Margaret Pickens was listed at this address. Mrs. Pickens was also shown at this address in 1939. Her daughter Grace Stewart came to care for her in Littleton in 1922 and married Taylor Stewart, presumably a relative of Claude Stewart, who appears at this address in city directories of the 1950s. The 1953 city directory indicates that Claude (Pat) Stewart lived here with his wife Nancy Ruth (Nannie) and seven children. The Stewarts had farmed at Sallisaw, Oklahoma, in their early married life. Mr. Stewart died in 1970. Mrs. Stewart was a full-blooded Cherokee Indian whose grandmother had made the "Trail of Tears" march from Georgia to Oklahoma in 1838. Nannie Stewart was an active worker in the First Baptist Church of Littleton. She died in 1977 at the age of 96.
