

Infrastructure Upgrades on the Way, Thanks to Voters

Thanks to voter support of the 2021 Ballot Issue 3A, which raises funds for an increased pace of capital projects paving the way for transportation improvements, economic growth, and innovation, Littleton's public works team is gearing up for a busy year of large-scale road and infrastructure upgrades.

Keep an eye out for detours and give crews space on the roadway! For more information, go to BigThingsLittleton.com. Here is a look at what is coming in 2025:

- The Santa Fe and Mineral Improvement Project is scheduled to begin construction late spring and will reduce congestion and improve safety with a realignment known as a quadrant roadway. This project will remove left-turn movements from the intersection, allowing for more "green time" at the traffic signal. The project will provide new traffic signals, lane configurations, signal re-timing, and mobility improvements at this intersection and surrounding areas. This will be the largest scale construction project within the city in the past several decades continuing through 2026 and potentially into 2027.
- The Mineral Mobility East Improvements Project Phase 1 will begin this spring, to provide safety and mobility upgrades along Jackass Hill Road, Mineral Avenue, and the Mineral Avenue Trail. The project includes upgrading existing bike lanes to buffered bike lanes, paving and providing designated space for pedestrians and bicyclists

- along the all-season Mineral Avenue Trail, and improvements to two of the High Line Canal Trail crossings in the area. The work is anticipated to be completed this fall.
- The Euclid Avenue Reconstruction Project will bring "complete street design" components to West Euclid Avenue between South Elati Street and the High Line Canal, part of the Safer Streets Littleton initiative.

Design elements include a 12-foot-wide shared-use path along the north side of the corridor, widened side-walks along the south side, three raised pedestrian crossings, curb extensions at intersections, and other traffic-calming elements. For more information, visit LittletonCO.gov/SaferStreets.

- The Platte Canyon Road Intersections Improvements Project focuses on the intersections of South Platte Canyon Road with West Mineral Avenue and West Bowles Avenue. The project will enhance pedestrian and bicyclist safety with new crossings, resolve traffic conflicts with expanded turn lanes, improve bus stop access with pedestrian ramps, and upgrade signal equipment. The project started in March.
- The Prince Street and Church Avenue Intersection Reconstruction Project will improve deteriorating infrastructure at the intersection of South Prince Street and Church Avenue with improvements to sidewalks and ramps, as



well as pedestrian and vehicular signals to ensure compliance with ADA guidelines. Additionally, the work will replace concrete and asphalt through the intersection, upgrade guardrails, and improve landscaped shoulders. Project activities are scheduled to start in summer.

■ West Euclid Avenue between South Gallup Street and South Windermere Street and several adjacent streets will be reconstructed this summer to create a stronger, smoother driving surface. This project will also create a safe and accessible pedestrian route on the northern side of Euclid Avenue, as well as connecting sidewalk gaps on several streets running north to south. This project will begin in mid-summer.

Critical Broadway Repair Will Close Lanes, Open Opportunities

An upcoming critical infrastructure repair project requiring lane closures and delays on South Broadway will also provide a unique opportunity to improve neighborhood connectivity and cyclist and pedestrian safety by adding a pedestrian underpass.

Last year, crews determined an aging metal culvert beneath Broadway just north of Jamison Avenue was deteriorating. While city engineers and specialists with Mile High Flood District have been able to temporarily stabilize the culvert, they also confirmed it must be fully replaced to ensure long-term safety and stability.

Replacing the culvert will require digging a 30-foot-deep trench to remove the old, damaged material and replace it with a more durable concrete pipe. This will require reducing traffic to one lane in each direction on Broadway for the duration of the project, expected to begin in April and be complete in early fall.

While digging into a thoroughfare as heavily traveled as Broadway is rare, it also provides an opportunity to tackle a long-desired project: adding a pedestrian underpass beneath

Safer Streets Strategic Plan Under Development

The City of Littleton's Safer Streets initiative has made significant strides toward improving pedestrian and cyclist safety, aiming to make the city safer for all who walk, bike, or drive. City staff is developing a strategic plan for promoting and advancing Safer Streets Little-



ton as a sustainable program. The strategic plan is being developed to build upon the base program established in 2024, including direction from city council and input and feedback provided by the Littleton community.

As a result, a vision, mission, and goals have been developed based on key philosophies:

Strategic plan philosophy: a change in safety begins with the city establishing a sustainable program; public engagement and education is critical to the program messaging; and future changes must put safety first.


Vision: reimagining Littleton's streets as safe, connected, people-first places.

Mission: the City of Littleton is dedicated to fostering a culture of safety through community-wide education, collaboration, and forward-thinking transportation solutions that continuously prioritize its commitment to the community's safety.

Goals:

- People-first streets: testing, adapting, and building out projects that are focused on all users.
- Culture change: utilizing education, programming, and events to achieve community support of a culture of safety.
- Data-driven decision making: guidance of the program should be based on data and public input.
- Collaboration and resources: focused efforts working with internal and external partnerships, as well as creating a sustainable program.

Encouraging Results for the Restorative Justice Program Partnership with Englewood

The Littleton Municipal Court has seen success with its trial of a Restorative Justice Program partnership with Englewood.

Defendants whose cases are referred to the program by the city attorney's office can either choose to enter the program or go through the regular court process of appearing before a judge. In 2024, the program's first year, 19 cases were referred to the program, with seven successful completions, two unsuccessful, and 10 still in progress as of February 2025. The program is administered by the Englewood Municipal Court.

When a defendant enters the program, affected parties in the case meet for a mediated discussion called a "restorative justice conference," after which an "accountability contract" is developed that the defendant must complete within a set time frame. The contract is tailored to each specific case and can include tasks such as paying restitution for any damages caused by the crime, or community service based on the defendant's interests or strengths.

"Structuring accountability agreements to align with offenders' individual circumstances not only helps repair harm within the community but also acknowledges their potential for growth and the value of their contributions to society," said municipal court administrator Danielle Trujillo.

Once the contract is completed, the charges against the defendant are cleared and their criminal record related to the case can be sealed or expunged. It typically takes about six months to go through the program.

Littleton's court staff is encouraged by the results of the 2024 trial program and are hoping to sign an intergovernmental agreement with Englewood this year to secure funding for a formal pilot program.

Littleton's Economy Gets a Boost from Incentive Programs

Economic incentives offered to qualifying businesses by Littleton's Economic Development team are helping boost the city's quality of life and support important services.

The goal of the incentive program is to foster partnerships between business owners and the city. By incentivizing well-planned business development, the city is able to strengthen its tax base, allowing for further investments in city infrastructure, public services, and city programs and bring new retailers to the city.

Here's a look at some of the accomplishments the incentives program saw in 2024:

- Number 38, a restaurant and bar planned for Littleton Village, received a sales tax rebate incentive to help encourage the company's decision to build on a vacant parcel. The project will provide nearby residents with an attractive new community gathering place, and projections show the city receiving strong sales tax revenues as a result.
- Mineral Place, a mixed-use retail and residential development in south Littleton that will be anchored by a Costco, received a sales tax rebate incentive to help offset high land acquisition and site work costs. Projections predict sizable sales tax revenue that will help support city services — revenue currently lost to nearby municipalities that offer more large-scale retail.
- Fifteen local businesses received Revitalization Incentive Grants, which help pay for exterior improvements like landscaping, lighting, signage, ADA compliance, and other additions to improve the overall aesthetic of the community.
- Eight businesses received COVID Recovery Grants, which help cover the cost of infrastructure improvements to businesses impacted by the pandemic in the Downtown Historic District. Improvements partly funded by the grant include the outdoor patio seating area at Denver Beer Co.

Broadway to connect the east and west sections of the Lee Gulch Trail, offering residents on the east side of Broadway safer access to the High Line Canal Trail on the west side.

Currently, pedestrians and bicyclists traveling along the Lee Gulch Trail must detour 800 feet to cross Broadway at the high-traffic intersection with Jamison Avenue, and cross an access route to AdventHealth Littleton Hospital, risking conflicts with vehicles.

A pedestrian underpass at this location has been identified for decades as a goal in numerous local planning efforts, including the public-led Broadway Corridor Study and the Littleton Linkages Trail Study, but was generally considered a long-shot due to the challenges of major work beneath Broadway.

The City of Littleton is working with local partners to secure funding to complete the underpass project alongside the culvert replacement.

Littleton has recent experience with culvert replacements, owing to some city infrastructure reaching the end of its operational life. In 2023, crews replaced a failed metal culvert beneath Jackass Hill Road, and later completed a similar project beneath East Mineral Avenue.

The City of Littleton will provide ongoing updates to this project as they become available, via channels including the city's website at LittletonCO.gov, social media, the *Littleton Report Online* e-newsletter, and the *Littleton Report* print newsletter.

City Secures Grant to Look to the Future at Geneva Village



The City of Littleton was selected in January as a recipient of the Urban Land Institute Technical Advisory Panel (ULI TAP) program to ex-

plore revitalization efforts for Downtown Littleton's northern gateway which includes the Geneva Village property. TAPs are volunteers with expertise who help communities address pressing land use issues, brainstorm potential opportunities, and provide recommendations to help inform next steps.

This panel will bring together volunteer experts from various fields to explore creative possibilities and recommend short-, medium-, and long-term steps for the site's future.

About the Study Area

The Geneva Village site is part of a larger 28-acre area in downtown Littleton that includes the historic Geneva Lodge, Geneva Park, and the Littleton Center. Originally designed in 1964 by Eugene Sternberg as affordable housing for retirees, Geneva Village has been under city ownership since 1975.

Looking to the Future

This effort aligns with the city's long-term vision for downtown, as outlined in Envision Littleton 2040, the Transportation Master Plan, and the Comprehensive Economic Development Plan. Key goals for the site include:

- Expanding diverse housing options to support residents at all stages of life.
- Enhancing downtown connectivity and walkability.
- Preserving historic design elements that emphasize natural light, green space, and community-focused design.
- Strengthening public-private partnerships to foster a vibrant and sustainable community.
- Supporting the idea of giving Littleton a "northern gateway" as outlined in Littleton Downtown Development Authority's (LDDA) Plan of Development.

City council has set a December 31, 2025, deadline for ceasing residential operations at Geneva Village. The city has been assisting residents with relocation support, and most have secured new housing within Littleton.

Permit Center Changes Help Increase Efficiency

Littleton's Permit Center is now operating under new hours designed to increase efficiency for customers. Walk-in visits are available Mondays from 1 to 4:30 p.m., and Thursdays from 8 to 11:30 a.m.

In-person appointments with city planners and development engineers may be reserved during walk-in hours or through the city's online scheduling system, and are available on Mondays and Thursdays. The Permit Center is closed on Fridays. Setting appointments allows planners and engineers to research questions before a customer arrives, increasing productivity.

The new hours allow permit technicians to focus solely on the customer during open hours, while enabling them to concentrate on permit processing at all other times.

Several types of transactions are available at the counter, including payments, picking up approved parking permits or public notice signs, obtaining over-the-counter permits for appliance installations such as water heaters and furnaces, or asking permit or code questions.

Customers can also call or email the Permit Center for simple questions, Monday through Thursday from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Call the Permit Center at 303-795-3751 or email Permits@LittletonCO.gov. Elati Street Corridor Study to Launch Soon

Littleton's transportation planners and engineers are launching the Elati Street Corridor Study, aiming to develop a vision and plan for Elati Street from Littleton Boulevard to the High Line Canal Trail. The goal is to transform Elati into a multimodal roadway that encourages more people to walk and bike.

The study will focus on improvements in transportation safety and accessibility that are appropriate to surrounding land use. This project will include extensive public engagement to help drive recommendations. This will include opportunities for all residents to provide feedback, focused engagement with those who live directly along the corridor, a student ambassador program with Euclid Middle School and Runyon Elementary School, a walk/ bike audit to assess the safety, accessibility, and comfort of the existing infrastructure, and multiple in-person and virtual engagement opportunities.

Homelessness Action Plan Moves into New Phase

A long-term plan to address homelessness in Littleton, Englewood, and Sheridan is moving into a new phase after Littleton City Council approved the 2025-2026 Tri-Cities Homelessness Plan of Action at its January 21 meeting.

In 2021, Littleton, Englewood, and Sheridan launched the Tri-Cities Homelessness Plan of Action, which ran through the end of 2024. The second iteration of the plan includes action items from the original plan that were yet to be completed, new action items focused on developing a long-term financial and governance model, and performance metrics to track success.

Goals of the Tri-Cities Homelessness Initiative include:

- Understanding the homeless situation in the Tri-Cities;
- Ensuring legislation is supportive and consistent in each city;
- Creating a coordinated approach with numerous groups and agencies to implement promising strategies;
- Supporting community education to ensure communication and learning.

The initiative has seen success. In 2023 and 2024, 57 individuals receiving services from Tri-Cities agencies were housed, representing a 34% exit rate from homelessness, well above the 22% state average. Tri-Cities also initiated the Homelessness Navigation Center and Bridge House Ready-to-Work program, scheduled to open this spring. A co-responder program was launched, connecting people experiencing homelessness with service providers.

Moving forward, areas of focus include:

- $\blacksquare \quad \text{Developing a long-term governance model with financial sustainability};$
- Expanding housing opportunities for single adults through models that could include permanent supportive housing, shared housing, and landlord outreach;
- Streamlining services for families experiencing homelessness, including helping prevent families from becoming homeless, partnering with service providers and school districts, and expanding housing vouchers;
- Sharing performance metrics, including action items completed and numbers of people receiving services, Navigation Center use, and Ready-to-Work participation and graduation rates.

South Platte Renew Earth Day River Clean-Up Event

Picking up discarded trash and recyclables helps keep green spaces and waterways looking great and improves public health and the environment by preventing pollution from seeping into vital water sources.



Littleton's meet-up spot is the Riverside Downs parking lot, near Pedal Bike Shop. For those unable to attend the April 26 cleanup day, South Platte Renew coordinates a virtual clean-up from April 13 to 26, inviting groups to clean up an area important to their community and submit photographs and the number of bags of trash and recycling collected on SPR's website. The virtual clean-up can be conducted anywhere worldwide.

"Root & Renew" Parks Vision Plan Adopted

After nearly two years of planning and community engagement, Littleton City Council adopted the Root & Renew Vision Plan at its March 4 meeting, providing an outline for the future of the city's parks, open space, and trails.

The plan focuses on four themes, based in equity, that give guidelines for projects



and improvements the city can undertake in the next few years. Those four themes are:

- Parks and Open Space providing desired amenities in city districts that are currently lacking those amenities;
- Activities and Trends seeking to provide new recreational activities, including water play and recreation, as well as other opportunities in line with national trends such as pickleball and disc golf;
- Resiliency and Nature recognizing parks as a strategy for climate resilience and the importance of low-water landscaping where feasible, and increasing the tree canopy for both residents and wildlife;
 Community and Culture sees parks as an opportunity for neighbors to connect with
- each other and the natural landscapes and seeking to increase opportunities for community connection through local partnerships and enhanced park design.

Root & Renew is largely based on two rounds of community engagement conducted in 2023 and 2024. These engagement periods collected input from nearly 1,000 Littleton residents, and included two online surveys, nine pop-ups at community events, parks, and recreation centers, and multiple community meetings.


